RAD: 13 October 2012, 0700 to 0800 at the McMahon Auditorium, 0800-1200 at the Special Event Center.

Treasury Mandate: Pay to go electronic by March 1, 2013 . A Treasury mandate will soon require us to pay our military, civilian and retired customers by electronic funds transfer. Beginning March 1, 2013, most of you who receive paper checks will receive your pay directly to your savings or checking accounts. You can get ahead of the rush by setting up direct deposit now. It's easy, it's safe and it gives you more control with less stress.

With direct deposit, we send your payment straight to your bank account. It gives you immediate access to your money the day your payment is due. It also eliminates the risk of lost or stolen checks, forged signatures and identity theft.

About 99 percent of DFAS customers already receive their pay by direct deposit. They're enjoying being paid on time without the risks of lost or misrouted mail. Direct deposit gives them the control they want over their personal finances while increasing their financial security.

New Law: On 6 August 2012, President Obama signed The Honoring America's Veterans and Caring for Camp Lejeune Families Act (H.R. 1627). The new law addresses some of the problems veterans have been facing recently including medical conditions caused by contaminated water used by families stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. The signed legislation also makes certain veterans' benefits, like VA loans, are more readily available. Additionally, this new law makes VA loans available to more surviving spouses, disabled vets and single parents, and VA loan limits return to \$729,750 to over \$1,000,000 for high-cost areas as well. VA: The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Secretary Eric K. Shinseki claimed that it has made great strides in meeting the challenges posed by a decade of war, and cooperation with the Defense Department (DoD) is crucial to continued progress. Shinseki continued saying that repeated deployments over

the last decade have created issues that don't show up immediately. More service members are surviving catastrophic injuries, but higher survival rates also mean complex casualties such as post-traumatic stress (PTSD), traumatic brain injuries (TBI), amputations, blindness, deafness and other injuries which can have compounding effects, he explained. In the face of these challenges, he said, VA has decided the compensation claims of 2.9 million veterans in the past three and a half years. In 2012, he expects that for the third straight year, VA will decide 1 million. Despite a backlog, VA is working with Pentagon officials to establish a single, common integrated electronic health record by 2014. For more about this subject, please go to:

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has approved more than 36,000 applications for the Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP), a new training and education program for unemployed Veterans to upgrade their skills for in-demand jobs. The program, a provision of the Veterans Opportunity to Work (VOW) to Hire Heroes Act of 2011, which was passed by Congress and signed by the President in November 2011, is managed by VA and

the Department of Labor (DOL) and allows qualifying Veterans to receive up to 12 months of education assistance equal to the full-time Montgomery GI Bill - Active Duty rate, currently \$1,473 per month. The goal of VRAP is to train a total of 99,000 Veterans over the next two years in more than 200 job skills that DOL has determined are the most sought-after by employers. House Passes New 'Stolen Valor'

Act: Those who lie about military service or make false claims about receiving military medals with the intent of benefiting from those claims would be committing a crime under legislation passed by the House last week. The House's 410-3 vote on what is known as the Stolen Valor Act came less than three months after the Supreme Court struck down the original act on the grounds that it violated First Amendment free speech rights. The new bill attempts to get around the court ruling by making clear that it applies only in cases where people lie about a military record with the aim of obtaining payment or other benefits. No Service Dogs:

The Department of Veterans Affairs will no longer pay for service dogs for veterans suffering only with post-traumatic-stress-disorder and other mental health disabilities. A 67-page, final draft of rules concerning veterans in need of service dogs was published today in the Federal Register and will become final in 30 days. In justifying its decision, the VA cited

"nationally established" and "widely accepted" training protocols for sight, hearing and mobility-assistance dogs and the lack of similar training protocols for mental health service dogs. I would like to remind each of you about Retiree Appreciation Day (RAD) on October 13, 2012 at the Special Events Center (SEC). The first hour will be held at McMahon Auditorium (07:00 – 08:00) with information from 4th ID CDR, Garrison CDR, EACH CDR, DFAS & Mountain Post Historical Center, then over to the SEC. We will have flu shots & approximately 40 other services / organizations to provide you with information.

One thing you can do as a Retiree to assist us with budget cuts is encourage all your friends to sign up @ RAD for our e-mail news letter; as postage goes up, the budget shrinks & we need all the help we can get. Additionally, sign up for “The Army Echoes” & DFAS newsletters online. You no longer need to give your full SSAN, just your last 4.

If you receive any pay from the government, as of 1 March 2013, all pay will be direct deposit, so you must have an account for direct deposit prior to that.

Did you know that you could withdraw from SBP if you were declared totally disabled from a service connected disability at retirement and for 5 continuous years after or if you were declared totally

disabled from a service connected disability after retirement for 10 continuous years? Contact your Retirement Services Office, SBP Counselor, for more information (526-2660/524-2342).

As I do every year, I encourage each of you to keep your information current with DFAS & also your affairs in order at home, as that makes it easier on your survivors.

News from the MEDDAC — Evans Army Community Hospital

It's Time for the Annual Flu Come-back.....

Just when you start forgetting about the nuisance, it circles back for its annual appearance. Flu season is almost here.

Influenza, or 'flu,' is caused by a virus that is spread through respiratory droplets in the air and on surfaces when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. There are a few ways these droplets enter another person's body. Someone can breathe them in or they can touch the eyes, nose, or mouth after touching a surface where infected respiratory secretions landed. Once a person is infected, symptoms usually begin to appear within one to four days and can last for up to two weeks. Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, muscle aches, fatigue, headache, and occasionally diarrhea and vomiting.

While most people who get the flu will have an uncomfortable but relatively mild illness, others are at high risk for severe illness and even death. Those people include infants, pregnant women, the elderly, and people with other illnesses that affect the ability to fight off diseases, such as cancer or autoimmune disorders. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) estimates that on average, 36,000 people will die each year from the flu or flu-related complications. In addition, people infected with the flu are more likely to develop bacterial pneumonia. People in those high risk groups should also be screened to determine

if they should get the pneumonia vaccine.

There are effective ways to prevent catching or spreading the flu. Important prevention activities include: washing your hands frequently, especially if you are sick, coughing or sneezing into a tissue or a sleeve and throwing used tissues away, staying home if you are sick so you don't spread germs and getting an annual flu vaccination.

According to the CDC, the flu vaccine effectively prevents flu infection for most people, and can lessen the severity of the illness in those for whom it doesn't provide complete protection.

Everyone over the age of 6 months is encouraged to get a flu vaccination each year. Yearly vaccinations are necessary because flu viruses tend to change over time, which means that the vaccine will have to change along with the viruses in order to be effective. The vaccine is now available in three different forms: a shot in the muscle, a nasal spray, and a shot under the skin. However, at Fort Carson, only the shot in the muscle and nasal spray will be offered.

Evans Army Community Hospital Preventive Medicine will host seasonal influenza immunization clinics for all TRICARE beneficiaries aged 6 months and up who need only a flu vaccination. The clinics will be held at the Family Readiness Center, building 6237 on Mekong St on the following dates:

Monday, October 15th through Friday, October 19th, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Saturday, October 20th, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Tuesday, October 23rd through Friday, October 26th, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Vaccinations can also be obtained during visits to your primary care provider or during established immunization clinic walk-in times.

Retirees may also be vaccinated during Retiree Appreciation Day on Saturday, October 13th, 2012, from 8 a.m. - noon.

Evans Army Community Hospital is losing thousands of dollars a year because of three letters....OHI. It stands for Other Health Insurance.



“If one of our beneficiaries has health insurance through an employer or private insurance program, we are required by law to bill that program.

Each year, TRICARE beneficiaries must fill out a DD Form 2569, declaring whether or not they have additional health insurance. Many people believe by doing so, it means their premiums will go up; this is not true. Instead, admitting to an additional policy has benefits for both the patient and the military treatment facility.


Not only will your other premium stay the same, but the services you receive at our facility count towards your deductible. We will bill your insurance company through our Third Party Collections Program

and that money comes directly back to Evans. It allows us to buy the latest equipment or services for our patients.

Once patients fill out DD Form 2569, the Third Party Billing Department will verify their information and give them a green OHI card. Beneficiaries then present this card with their DoD ID card each time he or she is treated at a hospital clinic.

If a beneficiary has other health insurance and does not declare it, there could be consequences. An outside agencies researches service TRICARE beneficiary information and compares that information to a list of outside insurance programs. If someone is found to have an additional policy and did not identify it, the military treatment facility can still bill for services rendered. In addition, falsification on your forms can be punished by a fine or imprisonment.

If you are paying premiums for another policy, you should make sure you tell us and use it. The Third Party Collections program ensures you are getting your money’s worth and it benefits the place where you are getting your health care. It’s a win for both.

Every year, members of the 4th Infantry Division Association gather to share stories and commemorate their accomplishments as veterans of the “Ivy” Division. This year, more than 200 veterans traveled to Fort Carson for the 4th Infantry Division Association reunion, July 23-28. The national 4th Infantry Division Association organizes veterans, Soldiers and friends of the Ivy Division in multiple capacities. It fosters patriotism, supports and honors Soldiers, and encourages historical research of wars to acquire and preserve records of service members. Prior to their arrival at Fort Carson July 26, the Iron Horse Veterans held a Historical Society Golf Event, took the Cog Railway tour and spent time reuniting with each other.

Veterans began their first day on Fort Carson by joining nearly 1,000 Soldiers for a pass in review at Founders Field. Military reviews can be traced back to the Middle Ages, when leaders would use ceremonies as an opportunity for a demonstration of strength. The U.S. Army’s first use of reviews was addressed in the Blue Book by Baron Friedrich von Steuben, the manual upon which much of the Army’s drilling practices are based. The division pass in review was held to recognize our honored guests (veterans) and show our appreciation for their service, the pass in review began with an invocation, followed by the rendering of honors to the

sound of 13 cannon rounds, and the inspection by MG Joseph Anderson, Commanding General, 4th Infantry Division and Fort Carson; CSM Wardell Jefferson, Senior Enlisted Leader, Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion; and COL Bruce Antonia, 4th Infantry Division Chief of Staff.

After conducting their inspection, MG Anderson and CSM Jefferson attached identical campaign streamers, awarded to the division for its participation in Operation New Dawn, in support of U.S. military operations in Iraq, to the Army and 4th Infantry Division colors, bringing the total number of campaign and battle streamers for the Army to 186, and the 4th Infantry Division Association to 23.

Streamers first came into use during the Civil War and represent a campaign. Each streamer is embroidered with the campaign name and the time period the campaign covered.

During his speech, MG Anderson took a moment to welcome the veterans and their families. “We have some very special people here with us who are such an important part of the fabric and legacy of our Army, the 4th Infantry Division” said MG Anderson. “We work each and every day to honor you and follow in your footsteps.”

After the conclusion of MG Anderson’s speech, the Iron Horse

Veterans received an invitation to lead the Soldiers as they passed before Anderson.

“The pass in review was fantastic and very uplifting,” stated a Vietnam veteran. “Getting asked to participate in the ceremony was a real treat.”

Following the pass in review, Soldiers, veterans, Families, friends and community leaders moved to Manhart Field to witness the groundbreaking for the 4th Infantry Division Memorial.

Manhart Field will no longer be a field where Fort Carson holds its ceremonies, but will be the home of the memorial which honors 4th Infantry Division as a whole

With the ceremonies behind them, the veterans participated in a tour of Fort Carson. Veterans visited the specific units or regiments they were assigned to during their service and toured their unit’s modern facilities, training sites, and ate lunch with Soldiers.

Many veterans enjoyed their visit to their unit’s motor pool, where they were treated to a number of static displays, which included military vehicles and weapons systems, manned by current members of the 4th Infantry Division “The technology they have today is way over what we had,” stated another, a Vietnam veteran.

Veterans also voiced appreciation for the Soldiers currently filling the ranks of their old battalions.

“I love the troops, they’re doing a good job and they look good, too,” . “I know they can handle the job” proudly stated by a Vietnam veteran.

The visit provided the Soldiers a chance to connect with the history of their brigade. “It gives me a little more pride in the unit to (hear) what the veterans before me did,” stated a Specialist, M2 Bradley fighting vehicle gunner, Company B, 1st Battalion, 68th Armor Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division “My favorite part has been hearing their stories and having the opportunity to meet

them.”

Following the motor pool visit, one group of veterans visited a barracks dedicated to 1st Bn., 8th Inf. Reg., Medal of Honor recipient 1st Sgt. David H. McNerney where his accomplishment were talked about by a Soldier currently assigned to the unit.

Veterans had the opportunity to take photos in front of the dedication plaque and tour the barracks rooms.

At the end of the day, the Ivy Division veterans and their families returned to their hotel to rest up for day two of their Fort Carson tour, which included visits to the Mission Command Training Center

and Close Combat Tactical Trainer.

Overall, the Iron Horse veterans were pleased with the reception they received from the 4th Infantry Division. The opportunity to provide a tour for the 4th Infantry Division also benefited the Soldiers that were able to take part.

It gives reassurance of what’s ahead of you; it re-establishes pride in being a Soldier.

The 4th Infantry Division Association will return to Fort Carson for an annual reunion in 2017, in honor of the Ivy Division’s 100th birthday.

For Soldiers and those who were Soldiers in the United States Army, weapons are a common item for them to possess. From their issued weapons, to privately owned firearms, these individuals are trained and familiar with firearms. Privately owned weapons, however, must be registered if they are going to be stored or brought on post. Fort Carson regulation 210-18 states that if a soldier, family member, or civilian plans to store or bring his/her weapon on post (even the Pinon Canon Maneuver Site), it must be registered within three working days of the

weapon being acquired. A violation of this regulation is a violation of Article 92, UCMJ (failure to obey a general order).

Those who do not live on post and have no intention of bringing the weapon onto post do not have to register their firearm with Fort Carson. Individuals possessing a Concealed Carry Permit from an off post agency may not carry a concealed weapon on post.

Pursuant to Colorado law (CRS 18-12-213), the State of Colorado will recognize a valid permit issued in another state IF the permit was issued to a resident of the state issuing the permit, and the permittee is 21 yrs of age or older, AND the other state recognizes Colorado permits as valid in their state as listed below:

When traveling with a Colorado permit, it is advisable to contact the state you are visiting to confirm reciprocity and to review that state's firearms laws. The state of Colorado no longer recognizes the validity of any permit issued by any state to a nonresident of that state.

Persons wishing to register their weapons on post need to pick up the forms at the Fort Carson Police Station. Do not bring a

weapon into the Fort Carson Police Station. All you need to do is write down the weapons information and bring it in. Any questions about privately owned weapons on post should be directed to the Fort Carson Police Station at (719)526-6199.

Fire:



We will be entering Fall before you know it. You will see a drastic change in temperatures and climate as the season rolls in. Fall in Colorado, can and will bring cool enough temperatures to start thinking about the use of your home furnace. Before you even think about starting that furnace, take the time to clear away any items that may have cluttered around it during the Spring and Summer months. Additionally, it is a good idea to start off with a new filter prior to start up and to ensure efficiency of the furnace, change out the filter periodically throughout the season. Finally, with the use of the furnace coming into play, it is a good idea to check your smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors for proper operation and good batteries.

Now that we have addressed the issue of indoor heating, let's take a minute to address the safety issues of outdoor fire pits. If you have an outdoor fire pit you should take the time to clean out any old debris from the season prior. Once the pit is clean, ensure any and all combustibles are clear of the pit prior to starting a fire. Once the fire has been started ensure children keep a safe distance from the pit at all times. Finally, when you are finished utilizing the fire for the evening ensure all remaining embers are out prior to leaving the pit unattended. We wish you and your family a safe and happy start to your Fall season.


